Lost and Found

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One of the key activities of the Russian Student Christian Movement in France is its summer camp for children, organized annually at La Servagère in the Vercors Mountains. This year's camp was marked by an unexpected discovery. On one of the last days, a small piece of paper was found in an old gospel book in the camp chapel. It is a note with prayers of intercession written in Slavonic on both sides. With the help of Hélène Klépinine-Arjakovsky, daughter of Saint Dimitri Klepinin, some of the names were identified. It turns out that the note was written in 1943 by someone close to Saint Mother Maria (Skobtsova) and her organization Orthodox Action.

It begins with a special prayer for the health of archpriest Sergius. This is Father Sergius Bulgakov, the legendary theologian, who co-founded the Russian Student Christian Movement and Saint Sergius Orthodox Theological Institute in Paris. At the time the note was written, he had cancer. He died in July 1944.

There are also intercessions for the imprisoned, with the traditional formula: "You who freed Peter from bonds and returned him unharmed to your Church, O Christ, free now your ser-

vants. . . ." The note lists members of Orthodox Action who had been helping prisoners of war and Jews in occupied Paris and were arrested by the Gestapo when this activity was discovered. These names include Mother Maria, priest Dimitri Klepinin, subdeacon George Skobtsov (Mother Maria's son), and Ilva Fondaminsky. All of them eventually perished in the concentration camps and were canonized as the Martyrs of Paris in 2004. Among the other identifiable names are priest Michael Belski, Theodor Pianov, George Kazatchkin, and Anatoly Viskovsky, all of whom took part in Orthodox Action.

The list of prayers concludes with intercessions for some other ill persons, none of whom has yet been identified. The author of the text, the context of its creation, and how it ended up in the gospel book at La Servagère are also unknown. But this discovery has already been identified by some as a sign. At a moment when the Archdiocese of Russian Orthodox Churches in Western Europe traverses one of the most serious crises in its history, a prayer for those who have become its beloved saints is found. And now it is not us who pray for them, but Saints Maria, Dimitri, George, and Ilya who pray for us all. *



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
